

TEEN DRIVERS underestimate the inherent danger in driving under the influence on special occasions.

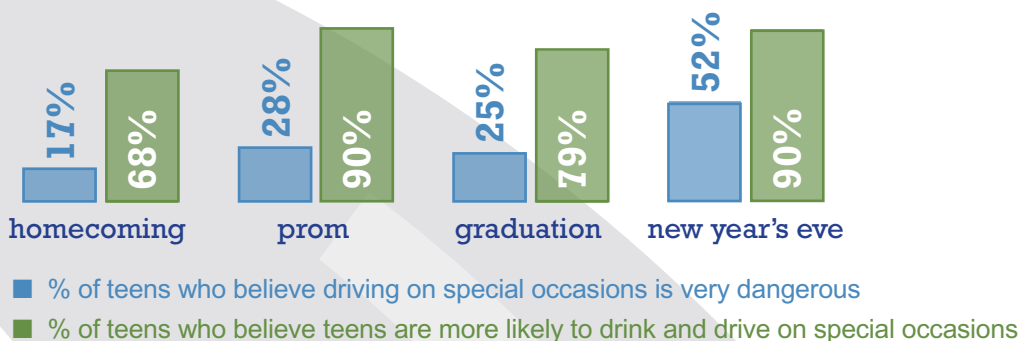


Based on a 2009 Liberty Mutual and SADD research study, high school teen drivers admit to being present in places where alcohol is being served.

36% of teens say their parents allow them to **attend** parties where alcohol is being served.

21% of teens say their parents allow them to **drink** alcohol when they are not around.

Although teens admit to believing that their friends are more likely to drink and drive on special occasions, few recognize the underlying danger that exists in such behavior.



Teen passengers believe that driving under the influence to be distracting; however, teen drivers do not always recognize the danger.

86% of teen **passengers** consider driving under the influence of alcohol to be very distracting.

Only **45%** of teen **drivers** consider driving under the influence of alcohol to be very distracting.

7 out of 8 teens do not lie to their parents about driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, and **91%** agree that it is important for their parents to trust their driving.
