

Distracted Teen Driving: An Alarming Epidemic

A 2008 study by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) indicated that at any given moment during daylight hours, more than 800,000 vehicles were being driven by someone using a hand-held cell phone. During that same year, nearly 6,000 people died and a half-million others were injured in car crashes involving a distracted driver, with teens having the highest proportion of distraction-related fatal crashes.

According to Dave Melton, a driving safety expert with the Liberty Mutual Research Institute for Safety, "because teens are novice drivers, they are more susceptible to crashes. Combine this inexperience with an ever-growing menu of distractions that cause them to lose focus on the road their surroundings, and you get the tragic images we've all seen in the news."

The Liberty Mutual/SADD Survey

Indeed, the enhanced technology and functionality of today's cell phone brings more opportunities for distraction. In a 2009 survey conducted by Liberty Mutual and Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD), 25% of teens admitted they use their cell phone to take photos while driving, 18% say they go online, and 15% update their Facebook status while behind the wheel. The good news is that 90% of teens said they would refrain from these behaviors if asked to stop by a passenger.
